#### PRINCIPAL COMMENTS



Hello to everyone,

Welcome back to the 2022 school year. It has been a busy time and students seem to be settling in well to their classrooms. This Term is proving to be one of challenge as we navigate through these COVID times and the subsequent operational restrictions. I do appreciate your understanding and patience. It is my aim to ensure that everyone in the school is kept safe and my decisions will always reflect that.

**COVID-19**: Level 2 restrictions will be in place from Thursday 3rd March. This includes wearing a mask for students from Years 3-6 in our school setting. The position of the school is this:

- Where possible students who can tolerate wearing a mask throughout the school day will be expected to wear one.
- Based on medical advice exemptions will be honoured.
- Based on a student's capacity and disability profile a common sense approach will be taken as to whether a student cannot tolerate wearing a mask (no medical exemption required).

Please continue to be diligent and follow the current health advice. I am happy to discuss your individual case if required. Do bear in mind that the WA Government mask mandate is for all indoor spaces and not specific to just schools; any exemption I may approve will not apply outside of school.

**Student Illness:** If your child is sick or showing signs of illness, please have them stay home to avoid the possible spread of infection. As usual, contact the school to let us know of any absence.


# Riverside Schools' Board Chair Report – Dr Alison Soerensen

# Riverside Schools P & C Update

Hello everyone,

Welcome back everyone to the new school year. The P&C hopes everyone has had a smooth start and your children are transitioning well to their new classrooms.

We continue to work hard to fill the role of Canteen manager. Three interviews have been conducted with no successful applicant thus far. We are keen to find the right person so the application and interview process is not being rushed. In the meantime, the Executive Committee has employed two casual staff members to cover the days the canteen is open.

The Canteen also has five new vaccinated volunteers who have come on board this Term. This is a great start for the year and we are hoping that more parents will think about helping out this year.

Some changes have been made to how students access the Canteen. Letters explaining these changes were circulated to families and the early response to the online system has been very positive. The changes and our communications to parents are supported by Facebook posts and by the support of both schools' teaching and administration staff.

With all the fresh ideas coming forward from our Executive Committee members, we are excited to report very positive feedback from students who are loving the variety of recess items available and the new slushy machine.

Regrettably, there will be price increases next term as many suppliers have raised their costs. Due to the low availability of some product lines from our regular supermarket, we have had to shop around for supplies and are working hard to keep prices as low as possible.

This year our focus is going to be on cooking fresh meals from recipes, more healthier options for Recess and Lunch and raising our Menu percentage from its current 60 green and 40 Amber. We also aim to develop a catering menu and have breakfast and lunch available to teachers on staff development days.

We give a big shout out to Kerrianne who has helped run the canteen during these first weeks of 2022. Ordering stock, developing the menu, recruiting volunteers, interviewing applicants, contacting suppliers, all while working in the canteen herself, taking care of her Treasurer's responsibilities and running her own family business with her husband. She is a marvel!

As president, I would also like to acknowledge my hard working Executive Team who have stepped in when needed, every little bit helps us provide what we can for all students of Riverside Schools.

Our AGM is coming up next month and with that comes concerns on whether we will fill all our Office Bearer positions. Please, everyone, take the time to think about whom you could encourage to join our P & C.

This year we have the pleasure of welcoming back the Ahern, Pierce and Yeoman families as Emma, Matthew and Nate enter our pre-primary group. I am also happy to welcome, on behalf of all staff in Room 31, the Cairns, Dechan, Jarman and Sharland families as Elijah, Jayce, Jai and Aidan begin their Kindergarten year with us.

I personally would also like to welcome back our Education Assistants: Mrs Kathryn Irvine, Mrs Florina Scott and Miss Mikayla Raabe. All three bring great empathy, high windows of tolerance and unconditional positive regard to their roles. I could not ask for more professional staff to support our students.

One of our classroom foci is establishing routine for our students. It is vital in aiding the children to develop feelings of safety and security, which in turn supports the ongoing development of the relationships between staff and students. Importantly, these relationships support the children in co-regulating with staff when they themselves are dysregulated. Our students are currently still overwhelmed somewhat by the whole school experience, and we are supporting them as they adjust to not being able to go where they want to go or do whatever they want to do. This takes a great deal of time, patience and empathy, as our students begin to adjust to another of our focideveloping behaviours that enable them to function more independently, as well as part of a group, in the classroom.

Our third focus for this semester is Communication. Our students are usually able to understand more than they can express. To support the development of both receptive and expressive

language, we have introduced the PODD, (Pragmatic Organisation Dynamic Display), a visual communication modality that uses pictures to represent words. It has been incredibly pleasing to see a number of our students already attending to the PODD and using it expressively. When a student can communicate, we observe less frustration and thus, more socially acceptable behaviour.

We look forward to bringing you updates of our students and our classroom as the school year progresses.

The aim of the teaching staff is that Room 11 will establish an environment to which your child will be happy to come each day and will feel safe, stimulated and contented. Already, we are making progress.



# **ROOM 33**

A big hello to the parents and carers of Room 33. We have had a fantastic start to 2022, just completing 2 weeks of swimming lessons at Avalon beach. The students had a fabulous time in what has been our hottest summer on record. They followed instructions and tried their hardest learning new skills and how to stay safe at the beach.

This year we have started earning 'Gotcha' tickets in our classroom. It is part of the Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) program adopted by both Riverside schools. If students demonstrate hard work, good listening skills, consideration and positivity they earn one 'gotcha' ticket. Ten 'Gotcha' tickets on their reward chart and they earn 20 minutes of a chosen reward such as playing games.

This semester we are working on Measurement and Geometry. Students have been using a ruler to measure length in centimetres. Some of our students are ordering lengths while others are

measuring to the nearest half centimetre or decimal. I am very impressed with how their skills have come on from last year.

In Health, we have revisited concept circles. Students made a caterpillar of themselves and each colour represented the concept colours and who belongs in each colour. For example, some students placed their Mum or Dad in their blue 'love hug' circle, and placed myself or another teacher in their yellow 'Hi-five' circle. Over the term, we will continue to revisit concepts such as private and public body parts as well as look deeper into safe and unsafe secrets.

Finally, in Media Arts we have been looking at logos. We identified what a variety of different logos were promoting and selling as well as matching the logos to their products. It was surprising to see how well all of the students in Room 33 knew logos, such as the Nike tick represented running shoes. We will continue to explore this further and create our own logo to sell a product.

Now that swimming is over, we are excited to get our teeth in to lots more learning. Until our next up date, keep smiling and staying cool.

Hello families and carers,

Welcome back to school. What a hot start to the school year we have had. Lucky for us swimming lessons in weeks 3 and 4 gave everyone a welcome break at Avalon Beach.

Students have settled well into their new class and are working hard despite the heat. During our English sessions, we are looking at narrative writing. Students are reading a simple narrative and breaking it down to see the elements that story writing use to create narratives. They are then using a framework to create their own story. The students are very creative and are beginning to use some great descriptive words to give the reader a clear picture of what is happening within their stories.

Following reading testing students have been group into levels for guided reading. Guided reading is an instructional approach with a focus on meaning and problem solving strategies. Activities include word meaning, sentence structures, grammar and punctuation as well as and focusing on the characters and setting of the story. Guided reading also supports student's writing through story maps and modelled retelling activities leading to students being able to retell the story and write their own narrative. Students are enjoying the group activity and are able to support and their peers thus increasing their own knowledge.

Students are working hard to show demonstration of our PBS values – Respect, Inclusive, Safe and Engaged. Lots of activities were completed during week one so students could gain a good understanding of what the expectations of our class and school look like. Students demonstrating our class and school values earn tickets towards canteen vouchers as well as earning reward time during the class. It is great to see these values being demonstrated not only in class but around the school. Room 10 students are certainly providing a good role model to the younger students within our school.

It has been wonderful to chat with all of our parents and guardians about classroom routines and setting of goals for this semester. Unfortunately, due to COVID19 guidelines we were not able to meet face to face but I thank every family for their ongoing support particularly during these very different times. Student IEP goals are almost set and plans are now being developed to assist students in working towards achieving these goals.

Hello to all parents, families and carers of children in Room 4.

For those of you we worked with in 2021, we would like to welcome you back to our classroom and we look forward to seeing the progress your children make throughout this year. # Bunuru—season of adolescence

Representative colour: Orange

Second summer: February-March

Central theme: Coast living and fishing time.



Bunuru is the hottest time of the year with little to no rain. Hot easterly winds continue with a cooling sea breeze most afternoons if you are close to the coast. Therefore, traditionally this was, and still is, a great time for living and fishing by the coast, rivers and estuaries. Because of this, freshwater foods and seafood made up major parts of the diet during this time of year.

Bunuru is also a time of the white flowers with lots of white flowering gums in full bloom, including Jarrah, Marri and Ghost Gums.

Another striking flower that is hard to go past is the female Zamia (*Macrozamia riedlei*). Being much larger than that of its male counterpart, the huge cones emerge from the centre of the plant with masses of a cotton wool like substance.
