

We have been experimenting with amazing recipes for Wombat Stew and Possum Magic creations.




The children are enjoying copying their name, writing numbers and fishing for letters and are progressing both socially and educationally. Please enjoy this selection of photos of some of our activities.




This term we have continued to explore sea and land animals and complete some information sheets on the life cycle of hens and butterflies.

Manatj – the white cockatoo
Doornart – the 28 parrot
Karak – the red tail black cockatoo


Hello everyone.

SCIENCE update

Greetings parents, carers and guardians,

It's hard to believe that we're already in the final weeks of Term 4. This term has been filled with different experiments, assessments, and exceptional work by everyone. I'm grateful for the hard work and achievements of each and every one of our students.

The junior years have been learning about movement and forces and have been applying their knowledge to better understand how animals and people move. Pictured right is an example of Jai from Room 32 diligently sorting pictures of animals based on how they move.

The middle years have been extending their understanding of contact and non-contact forces by applying their knowledge to new ideas and experiments. One experiment consisted of students creating and designing their own bridges made from drinking straws and cardboard. The students were tested on how much weight their bridges could hold. It's great to see our students applying their understanding to new ideas, to develop their scientific knowledge of physical science further.


