Hello to our families and carers, and welcome to Term 2. This term is moving along very quickly, and we are getting ready for swimming lessons in Weeks 6 and 7.

In English we have been continuing our Fairy Tale Theme and have read the stories Red Riding Hood and Goldilocks and the Three Bears. Students are really enjoying the stories but particularly the craft activities that show characters or scenes from each story. It is wonderful to see the big progression of cutting skills that they are demonstrating. Every student should be very proud of the amount of care and attention to detail they are maintaining and enjoy presenting their finished work to their peers and teachers.

In Maths we have been focusing on subitising and playing lots of games to see if we can recognise the numbers without counting the dots. What a great way to spend a math session – playing games and learning at the same time.

In Health our focus these last couple of weeks has been on early warning signs and we have read the story Jasmine's Butterflies to help with understanding what happens to our body when we feel scared. When completing our activities, it is great to hear the students identifying and correctly labelling the early warning signs.



Our cooking lessons have continued and this term we are making Pinwheels. This week it has been great to see the students being so confident in understanding the steps of the recipe and becoming independent in making our recipe. We have made vegemite and cheese (the favourite) tomato paste and cheese. Our dough base keeps getting better each week! They smell delicious and taste even better.

As we start our assessments and begin thinking about reports it is a good time for the teaching staff to see just how much progress our students are making. I look forward reflecting on the semester and the goals that have been set. Parent meetings will commence following the issuing of reports.

Hello families! My name is Eve (Miss Hannah). It is a delight to join the Riverside Education Support team as Room 31 teacher from the start of this term. The last few weeks have been a period of settling in and developing trusting, harmonious relationships with students and staff. It's so important in the early years that students feel safe and supported at school.



An inclusive, welcoming and safe environment fosters healthy emotional & social development, which in turn helps children to learn better. Creating



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inviting, defined spaces in the physical environment such as our new calming, cosy, quiet/book area. This is a soft space where students can regulate, relax and read a book if they choose. I personally have a passion for reading, books, poems, rhymes or any kind of literacy activities.

A large focus in our curriculum is on functional/life skills development in tandem with core curriculum skills such as literacy. This term we have

begun to integrate these by visiting the school library. We have started by taking one student at a time. Our goal is to eventually visit the library as a whole class. All the students were engaged and seemed in awe of the library environment with the large selection of books.

There are many learnings from these visits such as safe walking skills, listening & following directions, appropriate voice levels, book-handling skills, pre-reading & literacy skills and of course pure enjoyment and

developing a love for books, school & learning. This also links in with the value of respect that we include in our positive behaviour and implicit curriculum. Students are learning to respect their own and others' bodies and belongings. In the library, they are learning to respect communal items such as

books and puppets.

Building a national picture of child health

From May 2024, our school, along with thousands of others across the country, will participate in the Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

The AEDC is a teacher-completed census (similar to a questionnaire) which provides a comprehensive picture of how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school.

The AEDC is an Australian Government Initiative and is completed nationally every three years.

Children don't miss any class time while the AEDC is completed, and parents/carers don't need to supply schools with any new information.

The data collected through the AEDC is used by schools, communities and governments to better understand children and families' needs, and identify the services, resources and support they need.

AEDC data is reported at a school, community, state/territory and national level.

AEDC results for individual children are not reported and the AEDC is not used as an individual diagnostic tool.

Some teachers have found that completing the AEDC made them more aware of the needs of individual children and their class, and that the data was useful for planning for transitions to Year 1 and developing programs.

Participation in the AEDC is voluntary, however the AEDC relies on all schools with children in their first year of full-time school participating in the collection. Parents/carers don't need to take any action unless they choose not to include their children in the census.

It has been a busy start back to the term for our students as they work hard toward achieving their IEP goals. We are proud to share that all students have shown great improvement across their morning reading, spelling and letter recognition tasks. It is wonderful to see them gain confidence and pride in their abilities.

In Literacy, students have completed their fairy-tale theme with their final story, Goldilocks and the Three Bears. We have been impressed with their retell, particularly when it comes to time to roleplay.

In Maths, students have been developing their skip counting skills. This is an essential skill for them to learn as it helps them understand the early concepts of multiplication and division. It also helps them count quickly and efficiently, which is essential for solving math problems.

Students have been enjoying our measurement unit as they compare and order several shapes and objects based on length, area, volume and capacity using different uniform and informal units. The 'capacity' concept was a favourite among the students as it involved a lot of water play.

A continued and big behavioural focus for this term is safe hands

and feet, and we are working hard to ensure that all students keep their hands and feet to themselves. We have a catchy song that we sing multiple times

throughout the day where students can demonstrate safe hands.

Hello families and carers.

This term in English we are continuing to focus on narratives with a special emphasis on "Possum Magic" by Mem Fox, a delightful Australian tale following the journey of Hush, a young possum. Students have enjoyed retelling the story orally and developing an awareness of the use of punctuation to assist with reading with expression. Additionally, throughout the term, students will embark on a creative diorama project showcasing Australian animals, seamlessly integrating with our literacy sessions.

This term, we're fortunate to welcome Miss Michelle Webster, a final year student from Murdoch University to our classroom for her six-week placement. The students are thoroughly enjoying the engaging and entertaining activities Miss Webster has planned for them.

In Maths, students have been looking at 2D and 3D shapes. They have been discussing the properties of them and comparing their shapes. Our students have also enjoyed the measurement unit using direct and indirect comparisons to decide which is longer/shorter, holds more/less, or is heavier or lighter. There are so many fun activities to do that help them with understanding the language of measurement. In Maths we are continuing to focus on understanding the value of numbers and using mathematical knowledge in practical situations. The class is continuing to improve mental mathematics so the students will develop the skills to work through problems faster.

In our Design and Technology class, students will be introduced to basic coding techniques using iPads. The students will be able to create their own interactive stories.

We are looking forward to the rest of the term with swimming lessons in week 6 and week 7.

Greetings to our parents and carers of Room 19 students.

We in Room 19 are off to a flying start and it's unbelievable that we are already nearly halfway through Term 2. The students have settled back into school well after the holidays and are working hard toward accomplishing their IEP goals for Semester 1.

Over the current semester, we have been exploring Fairy Tales within the Literature component of English. The students enjoy recreating each tale using stick puppets and a scene from the story built onto our sensory table using resources from around the classroom.





We continue to build number sense in Maths, working on exploring and creating BIG numbers. This term in Measurement, we are exploring length, capacity, size and weight.

A focus for Room 19 is to develop reciprocal and cooperative relationships within the classroom. This ties in with our protective Behaviours topic of personal space and the school rule of 'keeping our hands and feet to ourselves'. It has been wonderful to see relationships

within the classroom develop with the students increasingly playing and working cooperatively.

We are currently preparing for swimming lessons in weeks 6 and 7 and while it will be a busy two weeks, the students are very excited.

Hello to all parents, families, and carers of students in Room 36.

This term has been moving very fast and we cannot believe we are in Week 4 already. The students have settled back into school well this term and are very excited for their upcoming swimming lessons.



In Mathematics, our class has been learning about shapes. Students have been learning about how to identify the differences between 2D and 3D shapes, sorting shapes into groups, identifying the nets of different 3D shapes, and identifying the separate 2D shapes that make up 3D shapes (e.g., a cube is made up of 6 squares). Some students have also been learning how to measure the perimeter and area of different shapes. They have also enjoyed making shape puzzles as free time when they finished their activities early.

In Protective Behaviours, we have been talking about about early warning signs. Students are learning that early warning signs are signs our body gives us when we might be feeling scared, nervous,

sad, or like something is not right. They have also been learning about public and private places at home, school and in the community.





In Design and Technology, we have continued lessons about different materials and how to describe their

properties. Students also learned about how Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people discovered the different properties and uses of materials to make items such as shelters and hunting tools. Learning about different materials has helped them with the planning and construction of their own huts! We began by discussing what materials could be collected to make shelters, then set about collecting these materials from around the school. In the next lesson the students set about building their huts. But this was not just simple construction; the students were challenged to design a hut or shelter that would be able to stay standing when the wind blows. We are excited to see next week which shelters pass the wind test!

We look forward to bringing you updates of our students and

our classroom as the term continues.

Miss Cassy Chats About Science and The Arts

Hello families,

In science classes this term we continue to focus on chemical sciences. In the senior primary years this has involved learning about different states of matter and types of changes. The students have been exploring physical and chemical changes and properties of different materials through investigations. They are also learning about making predictions and conducting experiments.



In the junior primary years, the students have focused on using their senses and describing materials properties while using the PODD. The students have explored various materials and investigated where some of them come from and are used for. They have also used their knowledge of materials to sort recycling and have started collecting and identifying recycling in their classrooms. Some classes have been working hard on creating their own recycled robot sculptures!







In visual arts the students have been creating some abstract art to explore the art elements and principles. They have been focusing on the elements of line, colour, shape and the principles of pattern and contrast when creating and discussing artwork. The students have researched and

explored different artists and art styles to inspire their work. The mediums most explored this term have been felt-tip markers, paint, watercolors, oil pastels and digital art.
