

As we settle into Term 3 it has been nice to meet with parents to discuss their child's report and goals for the coming semester. This term appears to be a very busy one - we are almost halfway through it already.

In English we are continuing to work on letter recognition and learning to blend the letters to make words. It is wonderful to see the students trying hard and working with staff on their blending skills to read and write CVC words. We are using sound boards, bingo games, magnetic letters amongst other activities to help consolidate how to blend letters to make a word. The students are getting quicker reading and spelling CVC words which is fantastic. Next step is to put these words into sentences.

In Maths our focus for the start of term in Number has been on fractions. We can sort shapes into equal or unequal parts and have been learning the language of 'whole and half'. Our favourite activity so far has been making fairy bread and cutting it into two equal parts to show halves. We also continue to reinforce numbers to 50 with the introduction of skip counting. The students are engaging well with the interactive whiteboard by colouring numbers as we skip-count in 2's, 5's and 10's. They are beginning to recognise the pattern and continue counting until we reach 50.

Our year 1's have started horse riding this term. RDA at Fairbridge are wonderful to work alongside and luckily the weather has been fantastic. Students have been able to use the outside arena and take some walks around the beautiful village. Our thanks to the volunteers at RDA for their support. Our students have so much fun.

As we embark on a new term and semester, it brings with it a flurry of activities and learning opportunities for our students. I want to thank the parents and families who took the time to coordinate meetings to discuss their child's progress. Your involvement and support are integral to our students' success, and I appreciate your collaboration.

This semester, our students will continue to enhance their phonic knowledge and development through tailored tasks and interactive games. Among the student favourites is the "Say It, Jump It, Run It" activity, where hoops are set up on the ground, each featuring different sounds and graphemes, including CVC words and spelling words. Students enthusiastically say the sounds/graphemes as they jump from hoop to hoop and then run from start to finish, seamlessly blending the sounds as they move along the course.

In mathematics, students have started learning new areas

such as statistics and probability, number patterns, fractions, and financial mathematics. Financial mathematics is a favourite, as students role-play a shopping scene to mimic a real shopping experience. Each student receives a purse with pretend coins, roleplays catching a bus to the shops, and spends their money on items at our shop setup. This not only enhances mathematical skills but also offers a fantastic opportunity to incorporate social, emotional, and communication skills. Students take on roles such as shopkeepers, bus drivers, and customers while also learning about appropriate behaviour for public settings.

In our health program, we have been placing a strong emphasis on promoting the development of healthy and active bodies,

aligning our activities with the spirit of the Olympics. In the image at right, Zen is enthusiastically making his healthy treat in Health class - dark chocolate melted on rice cakes with a selection of goji berries, pumpkin, and chia seeds.

Students have been preparing for the Faction Carnival scheduled for Friday in week 6. This event involves both schools, and practices take place on the oval every Monday. We are excited to welcome our families to come and support our students during this event in week 6.

It is hard to believe we are nearly half way through Term 3 already! It has been such a busy term so far and so many exciting things to come. 
## **ROOM 36**
