

#### SCIENCE UPDATE



Hello to all parents, families, and carers.

As we near the end of the year, it is wonderful to reflect on all the science learning this semester. It has been such a pleasure to teach all of the students and see their progress as they have worked hard toward achieving their goals.

This term during science lessons, the students have been gardening and growing seedlings while learning about plant needs and their parts. The students decided on which seeds to grow and it was interesting to predict whether the plant seeds would be large or small before gently planting them into the soil. They were fascinated to see how quickly they could grow each time they cared for the garden. The students in years 4-6 have also been experimenting with the seedlings based on their predictions about changing plant conditions.

Students have also been learning about insects and animals including where they live. We have been going on bug hunts and learning about the macro and micro habitats of different insects. Students practiced their observational drawings and ensured the insects were returned safely to their microhabitats.

We are now creating dioramas of insect and animal habitats and some students are creating their food chain of Australian habitats. The year 5-6's are concluding the semester and consolidating their learning with a research presentation on an animal they have chosen.

Well done to all of the scientists for a fantastic year of science learning!

Another year is almost over and what a busy few weeks it has been in building up to the finish. The students in room 37 have been working so hard to finish their IEP goals and I'm glad to say we have now finished, and reports are completed. Each student has improved in their literacy, maths and health goals and I am proud of how far each of them has come.



In addition to our learning, the past few weeks we have enjoyed some fun activities. Colour Run was a highlight enjoyed by all students who participated. We were the first to run through the course and many stayed on for several laps, getting wetter and more colourful as the laps progressed.

Our Fun Fridays have continued with cooking creations such as oat and milo slice and fried rice. We have also started our Christmas cooking season and have so far made rocky road and

Christmas cookies. Our cooking discussions centre around healthy eating, sometimes food and family traditions. Each week, when we choose our recipe, there is normally at least one or two students who are disappointed with the choice due to their belief that they will not enjoy eating it. During this time, we discuss the importance of trying new foods as well as cooking for others. However, by the time we are serving up on Fridays, most students are keen to sample what we have made and it is unusual that any student decides they do not like the taste. I have also seen an increase in resilience when they decide they do not like it, with statements such as "at least I tried something new". It is such a joy to see the increased engagement, willingness to try new things and overall excitement for all students during our cooking activities.

As we approach the end of 2024, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the parents of Room 37

students for working with me this year to provide a safe and enjoyable learning environment for your children. It has been an absolute joy to work with each of them, the new ones this term, the ones who moved rooms this term, and the three who have remained all year. They have all worked so hard, learnt so much and I will miss them all.

#### BIRAK is here

The Noongar Season 'Birak', represented by the colour red as it symbolises heat, sun and fire, takes in the warm days of December and January. During Birak season the rain eases and the warm weather really starts to take hold. The afternoons are cooled by sea breezes from the south west.

Traditionally this was the fire season. An almost clockwork style of easterly winds in the morning and sea breezes in the afternoon meant that this was burning time of the year for Noongar people and they would burn the country in mosaic patterns. Benefits included fuel reduction, increased grazing pastures for animals, aiding seed germination and making it easier to move across the country.

There are many fledglings venturing out of nests in Birak, though some are still staying close to their parents such as magpies and parrots. Reptiles will also be shedding their old skin for a new one.

With the rising temperatures and the decreasing rainfall, it's also a time for the baby frogs to complete their transformation into adulthood.
